I. WHEN IT COMES TO PASTORING......

A. Seek to Understand

1. Listen

Ponder the wound & confusion with them. Really listen.

2. "Read"

"Body language is mute, but it can still scream loudly." (Have a New Teenager by Friday, by Dr. Kevin Leman)

Reading People by Dimitrius & Mazzarella

What Every Body is Saying by Navarro

3. Ask Questions

Don't assume you know the reason for their questions or confusion.

B. Impart with Heart

- 1. Don't try to be nicer than God. Offer the velvet brick of truth with kindness.
- 2. The only time Jesus described himself personally was in Mt. 11:29 to crowds "...I am meek (kind) and lowly (humble) of heart..."

C. Pray

- 1. WITH them & FOR them
- 2. This acknowledges that you don't know them completely or know all the answers, but your hope for them resides in a God who does.

D. Offer Discipleship

- 1. **Meet regularly for a season of time.** Teens thrive on healthy relationships. **This takes.....**
 - a. Consistency
 - b. Patience
 - c. Interwoven fun &/or laughter "Laugher happens when our minds come together and something unexpected happens. We feel the ping of common recognition. We laugh to celebrate our shared understanding. We see each other." (How to Know a Person by David Brooks) It creates a bond, affirms value, & communicates acceptance just as they are.
 - d. Connecting with others in the process. (This relates to "assignments")
 Maybe in group discussion, or just in activity. Both of these help with validation & a healthy self-esteem.
- 2. Create personal identity "assignments" that...
 - a. <u>Inform & instruct</u> regarding their worth from God's perspective
 - b. Connect with their personality type & traits
 - c. Can fit into their daily/weekly schedule reasonably



II. DEFINING "IDENTITY"

- The qualities, beliefs, personality traits, physical attributes, interests and/or expressions that characterize a person
- The capacity for self-reflection and self-awareness
- How a person identifies & defines themselves as a contributor to the society around them.
 - A. The Basic Makeup of a Person's Identity?
 - 1. Personality types & traits
 - **2.** Family placement (1ST born, middle child....., blended family placement....)
 - 3. **Talents/Gifts** (athletic/non-athletic, musical/non-musical, artistic/non-artistic, scientific, mathematical, prophetic, merciful, giving, administrative...)
 - **4.** Personal pathway/events or circumstances that occur in our developmental years & our current situation (Christian/non-Christian, healthy/unhealthy, abusive/loving, social status financial status...)
 - **5. Season of life** (age, health/disability...)
 - 6. Ethnicity/cultural inheritance
 - 7. **Spiritual journey** (saved at young age, recently, sincere believer, trained to walk out beliefs, water baptized, filled with the Spirit...)

We're all made uniquely and our pathways are unique to us as well. We do NOT fit into a prescribed box.

B. Adolescent Identity Formation

- 1. This refers to the stage between childhood and adulthood in which an adolescent's identity is shaped by multiple factors, such as physical changes, cognitive development, communication skill development, and societal expectations including education, parents, peers, pastors & mentors.
- 2. Factors that strongly influence the health of adolescent identity development include the level and meaningfulness of parent & peer support ["psychosocial well-being"], environmental stresses, and their ability to form personal interests, commitments, and goals.
- 3. The most common stressors adolescents face are personal struggles with self-esteem and confidence. With healthy relationship development & consistent communication from family, friends, pastors, & mentors, most teens negotiate adolescence well.

III. STUDENTS NEED TO KNOW THEIR IDENTITY FORMATION FROM GOD'S PERSPECTIVE

A. In Your Creation: You are "very good" – above His other creations [Gen 1:31]



You have worth because of "whose" you are, not 'who' you are.

- 1. Genesis 1:26-27 He created me.
- 2. Job 10:8 Your hands have made me.
- 3. Psalm 139:13 You have covered me in my mother's womb.
- 4. Genesis 1:31 "...it was very good."

You are "very good" but...: Romans 3:23, 24 – "For <u>all</u> have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, being justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus."

Some have been told, like I was, that <u>you can BE anything and DO anything in life you want & be HAPPY. – You can't. To be fulfilled you must be and do the will of God. To be it – is to realize you're a sinner saved by grace. To do it – is to seek His guidance.</u>

"What we make of ourselves, by God's grace plays a part in our self-esteem but it is not the primary basis. [You can either bolster or shred what God has made you to be – the choice is yours. What you 'make of yourself' is not the PRIMARY basis of your worth. This is why those who are deemed to be successful in the eyes of many commit suicide. They are on a search for true worth and value that they never discover in their field of "success." We can never do enough to establish our true worth. That worth comes from God, our creator.

Word pic: Compare a person to a gold necklace and you'll see better what I mean. A gold necklace has worth because it is a necklace, but it has a prior worth because it is gold.

Humans are like that: No matter what shape we are in, what abuse we have endured at our own hands or the hands of others. We are precious simply because we exist. Sin doesn't ruin our worth, even if it does create an obstacle that affects our function. Sin does not ruin your VALUE to Creator God]

Worth isn't found in our accomplishments, nor in our salvation, but in something that comes <u>prior to</u> those two: <u>our creation. We have worth because God has created us.</u> [Just sitting here – You have worth!]

Your teens need to know..... No matter how much they fail, how little they accomplish, how many exams they fail, or how much they sin, they have worth. No matter if they make the team, get first seat in the orchestra, are acknowledged in their field of study or art. No one and nothing can touch their value; not shame, not guilt, not failure, and not the criticisms of a parent, teacher, coach or anyone else. They have value because of Whose they are, not who they are in the moment now or the moments of tomorrow.

- B. In Your Beginning: You are well planned and greatly loved. [Psa. 139]
 - Developmental Stages

The Lord's perspective of you did not begin at the cross – Your perspective of Him began at the cross.

Psalm 139:1-4,13-16 (NIV) "O Lord, you have searched me & you know me. (2) You know when I sit & when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar. (3) You discern my going out & my lying down; you are familiar with all my ways. (4) Before a word is on my tongue you know it completely, O Lord....(13) For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. (14) I praise you because I am fearfully & wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. (15) My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place. When I was woven together in the depths of the earth, (16) your eyes saw my unformed body. All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be."

a. Foundation Building Stage

(1) Cycle: *Birth-6 yrs*. [0-6]

- 50% of characteristics (personality tendencies) developed by age 3
- 75% of characteristics developed by age 5
- <u>"Pre-formal thinkers"</u> What is said & done is accepted, not analyzed. Whatever people tell you is 'true' & accepted.

 (i.e. "We're going to a fun place! This will be fun! Jump! I'll catch you!")
- "Magical thinkers" What is imagined is real.

 Imagine that there are monsters under the bed.Imagine that God is a big eye or a being with many eyes that will see you if you're naughty.

(2) Focus: Discipline Development

- Developing discipline is simple if consistent at this stage.
- When discipline is lacking, children become <u>self-centered</u>, <u>demanding and</u> <u>insecure</u> because they don't know where the <u>boundaries</u> are.

b. Training & Educational Basics Stage

(1) Cycle: 6-12 years [6-11]

<u>"Concrete thinkers"</u> – **Begin to develop logic.**_What's right/wrong (good vs. bad) – "good boy/nice girl"

Needs fixed rules as logic develops.

'Right/Wrong'

i.e. narrow glass vs. wide glass – narrow glass appears to have "more milk" so it "does have more milk! – that's obvious & logical!"

'Good boy/Nice girl'

Wants autonomy but feels **abandoned**, **worthless & shamed** if left alone too much.

(2) Focus: Information/Education

Image of self-worth can be wounded by unrealistic expectations of parents and/or through self-imposed comparisons.

c. Skill Development Stage

(1) Cycle: 12-20 years [12-18]

<u>"Logical Thinkers"</u> – **Begin to reason, rationalize & manipulate their environment.** No longer a child, yet not an adult – reaching for maturity, but not quite there.

- Develop social relational values & skills.
 "I'm acceptable if I..."
- Develop reason & rationale.
 "If I do 'this,' it will make up for 'that.""

Factors that influence identity development in adolescence:

- 1. Level of parent support
- 2. Level of peer support
- 3. Environmental stresses
- 4. Ability to form personal interests & goals

(2) Focus: Developing Self-control

- Must have opportunities to fail/succeed without major correction
 much encouragement.
- Need to work on consistent growth & developing responsibility.

d. Apprenticeship Stage [Young Adult]

(1) Cycle: 20-30 years [18-30]

- Personal identity further developed & defined.
 Leaving & Cleaving Emancipation from parents & Embracing adult responsibilities.
- <u>Social skills & values solidified.</u>
 <u>Social circle enlarging</u> singleness & healthy friendships, marriage, babies, children starting school.

(2) Focus: Serving

- Separating desire from expectations in relationships in a healthy manner.
- Giving honor to others in deference & humility.

Basic Personality "Temperaments" (Taken from <u>Transformed Temperaments</u> by Tim LaHaye)
The Sanguine person is <u>carefree</u> and full of hope; attributes great importance to whatever he may be dealing with at the moment, but have forgotten all about it the next. He means to keep his promises but fails to do so because he never considered deeply enough to help others, but is a <u>bad debtor and constantly asks for time to pay.</u> He is very sociable, given to pranks, contented, does not take anything very seriously, and has many, many friends. He is not vicious but difficult to convert from his sins; he <u>may repent but this contrition (which never becomes a feeling of guilt)</u> is soon forgotten. He is easily fatigued and bored by work but is constantly engaged in mere games – these carry with them constant change, and persistence is not his forte.

People tending towards melancholia attribute great importance to everything that concerns them. They discover everywhere cause for anxiety and <u>notice first of all the difficulties in a situation,</u> in contradiction to the sanguine person. He <u>does not make promises easily because he insists on keeping his word, but has to consider whether he will be able to do so.</u> All this is not because of moral considerations but because interaction with others makes him worried, suspicious and thoughtful. It is for this reason happiness escapes him.

The **choleric** person is said to be hot-headed, is quickly roused, but easily calmed down if his opponent gives in; he is annoyed without lasting hatred. Activity is quick but not persistent. He is busy but does not like to be in business precisely because he is not persistent; he prefers to give orders but does not want to be bothered with carrying them out. He loves open recognition & wants to be publicly praised. He loves appearances, pomp and formality; he is full of pride and self-love. He is miserly; polite but with ceremony; he suffers most through the refusal of others to fall in with his pretensions. In one word, the choleric temperament is the least happy because it is most likely to call forth opposition to itself. [He receives the most open criticism.] **Phlegma** means lack of emotion, not laziness; it implies a tendency to be moved neither quickly nor easily but persistently. Such a person warms up slowly but he retains the warmth longer. He acts on principle not by instinct; his happy temperament may supply the lack of sagacity and wisdom. He is reasonable in his dealings with other people and usually gets his way by persisting in his objectives while appearing to give way to others."

3. God designed your appearance.

4. God chose your name

Isa. 43:7 (NIV) [His family name] "everyone who is **called** by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made."

Isa. 43:1 (NIV) [your personal name] "...Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have **called you** by name; you are mine."

5. God selected your family placement

These are tendencies!

- Gender issues can affect this.
- Blended family issues can affect this.
- Marriage later in life can affect this.

a. The only child

- Often pampered.
- Center of attention often enjoys this position.
- Center of focused expectations. [Can feel incompetent because adults are more capable comparatively.]
- May feel isolated, alone & socially stunted without siblings.
- Can be Self-focused & self-important.
- Relies on others serving them rather than them serving others.
- Feels unfairly treated when they don't get their own way.
- Manipulates one parent against the other to get their way.

b. The firstborn child

- Used to being the center of attention, as you were the only child for a period of time. May strive to keep or regain parents' attention through conformity. If this fails, may choose to misbehave to gain it.
- Usually had a lot of expectations put on you at the 1stborn.

- Have a strong (unseen) need for approval being right is very important.
- Tend to be leaders & achievers because you've been a 'little adult' most of your growing up years.
- Usually like being in charge but have very high expectations for yourself and are hard-driving on yourself as well as on others.
- May respond to birth of the 2nd child by feeling unloved & overlooked.
- Strives to protect & help others.
- Often strives to please.
- Compliant 1stborns are conscientious, care-giving servants.
- Strong-willed 1stborns are hard-driving achievers who tend to be perfectionists.

c. The 2nd child

- Most strongly affected by the 1stborn in the family & the way they treated you.
- Rarely has parents' undivided attention.
- Tries to 'catch up' or overtake the 1stborn.
- Develops abilities that the 1stborn doesn't exhibit.
- If 1stborn is successful in many areas, may feel insecure & uncertain of own abilities.
- Feels unnoticed or unseen from attention if a 3rd child is born.
- May act out in rebellious ways to gain attention may act negatively toward other siblings to gain emotionally needed attention.

d. The middle child

- Has neither the rights of the oldest nor the privileges of the youngest.
- Often feels that life is unfair.
- Feels unseen, unloved, and overlooked.
- Feels doesn't have a place of function in the family.
- Can become discouraged by being overlooked and turn to acting out negatively to gain attention or motivated to do something totally different than anyone else in the family in order to find your place.
- Usually are great mediators & develop good negotiation skills, due to constantly negotiating between the 1stborn & the lastborn.
- Often develop good people skills & have empathy for people because they've become accustomed to life being unfair.
- Usually more balanced in your thinking because of all the needed negotiating.

e. The lastborn child

• Tends to behave like an only child – feels that everyone else is bigger and more capable.



- Expects others to do things, make decisions, & take responsibility for them.
 Emotionally manipulates others to serve them.
- Can become critical, temperamental & impatient of others.
- Can become controlling & become the boss of the family in getting service & attention & your own way. Often makes the 1st born their strongest ally against the middle child.
- May feel that they are not taken seriously when they have input to offer.
- May develop feelings of inferiority through comparison or lack of service from others.
- Tends to think in extremes. Likely because they were coddled and cuddled one minute and put down and made fun of the next minute.
- They love the limelight. They love attention. Tend to be the clown, the entertainer of the family.
- Can be more carefree and vivacious, as all their needs are met through others so they are free to entertain.
- Are usually perceptive and good people-readers. Often excellent salesmen-type people.

C. In Your Redemption: You are a blessing & you have purpose

IV. THE BREAKDOWN OF THE HUMAN IDENTITY

A. Generational/Cultural Breaking Points

Characteristics / Traits of Gen Z

1. High Anxiety

- Deeply worried about the present.
- Shocked by, but not surprised by, terrorist attacks throughout the world. School shootings, bombings, etc. is what life has always included for them

2. Suicidal

- Teen mental health is deteriorating.
 According to a new analysis, the number of US teens who felt "useless" & "joyless" grew 33% between 2010-2015
- There was a 23% increase in suicide attempts (2010-2015) (theconversation.com)

3. Entrepreneurial spirit

- Strong sense of independence
- 42% expect to work for themselves during their careers

4. Want to make a difference in the world

- Creative thinkers
- Want to take an active role in their communities & in their futures.
- "...MTV conducted a nationwide survey of 1,000 respondents born after the year 2000 to see how they would identify themselves if they had a choice, they came up with the self-important name "the Founders" --- as in needing to "found the new world," rescuing it from the sins of the past."

5. Wi-Fi enabled but Lonely – Known as the "Isolated Nation"

- They are the "internet-in-its-pocket' generation.
- William Bernstein (American financial theorist & neurologist) says: "Gen Z is the first generation that is the product of what Bernstein calls the 4th great communication revolution: the 1st was language itself, the 2nd was writing, the 3rd was the mechanization of writing, and the 4th was the electronic encoding of information."
- Currently, teenagers spend approximately 9 hours a day absorbing media.
- We are constantly connected to a global internet community.
- We now live in a world that is "always on."
 - --92% report daily on-line use
 - --25% report going on-line "almost constantly"
- They are not married to any single social network.
- They are much **more private** about their personal information than Millennials. According to Pew Research, **57%** have never posted anything on-line due to privacy issues.
- They gravitate toward anonymous social media like *Snapchat*, *Secret*, & *Whisper* rather than *Facebook*.

• Only 15% prefer to interact with their friends via social media rather than face-to=-face.

6. Independent/self-directed learners

- "The ability to find whatever they're after without the help of intermediaries, such as libraries, shops, or teachers,....this has made them more **independent & self-directed** than generations before them."
- But...."Like no generation before them, Gen Z faces a widening chasm between wisdom & information."
- This sacrifices the education needed to interpret the contents of what is being read.

7. Racially Diverse & Racially Blended

- Gen Z is the most racially diverse of any generation to date.
- Multi-racial children are the fastest growing youth group in the US.
 - *The # of black & white multi-racial children rose 134%
 - *The # of mixed white & Asian descent grew by 87%
 - *The # of black & white marriages grew 400% in the last 30 years
 - *The # of Asian & white marriages grew 1,000% in the last 30 years.
- "The biological differences between ethnic groups the ones that account for shared characteristics among members of a race are minuscule. Researchers involved with the Human Genome Project have stated, 'If you ask what percentage of your genes is reflected in your external appearance, the basis by which we talk about race, the answer seems to be in the range of .01 percent." ("Do Races Differ? Not Really, Genes Show," by Natalie Angier, New York Times, August 22, 2000) Thus, "the concept of race has no genetic or scientific basis." (National Human Genome Research Institute, 'White House, Office of the Press Secretary" June 26, 2000) There is no deep unchanging essence that every member of an ethnic group shares. After putting together "a draft of the entire sequence of the human genome, ... researchers .. unanimously declared, there is only one race the human race." (article by Angier) An over-identification with ethnic identity can unnecessarily exacerbate racial division." ("A Practical Guide to Culture" John Stonestreet & Brett Kunkle)

8. Sexually Fluid Attitudes

- In the minds of many people, modern-day Christianity no longer seems Christian. Among young Americans, the following words or phrases were offered as possible descriptions of Christianity.
 - Anti-homosexual (91%)
 - Judgmental (87%)
 - Hypocritical (85%)
 - Old-fashioned (78%)
 - Too involved in politics (75%)
 - Out of touch with reality (72%)
 - Insensitive to others (70%)
 - Boring (68%)



- Not accepting of other faith (64%)
- Confusing (61%)
- The idea of "acceptance" is interchangeable with "affirmation."
- They are supportive of gay marriage & transgender rights.
- 9. Disappearing Childhood/KGOY (Kids Getting Older Younger)
 - Millennials were raised by over-protective parents; Gen Z is being raised by under-protective parents.
 - In the name of freedom & independence, Gen Z is growing up with the entire world within their vision. In having access to the previously hidden fruit of adult information, the child is expelled from the garden of childhood." (Neil Postman, The Disappearance of Childhood)
 - Through the internet, we ask children to embrace mature issues, themes, & experiences long before they're ready. They are being robbed of their innocence, their naivete, their ability to BE a child.
 - Today, 12-13 year olds are among the highest paid models in America, presented to us as knowing & sexually enticing adults.
 - It is virtually uncontested among sociologists that the behavior, language, attitudes, & desires even the physical appearance of adults & children are becoming indistinguishable.
 - Kids mirror the larger culture, from reality TV to materialism. Who they see is who they want to be.
 - Research has clearly established that teens who watch movies or listen to music that glamorizes drinking, drug use, or violence tend to engage in those behaviors themselves. A 2012 study showed that movies also influence teens' sexual attitudes & behaviors. A study in *Psychological Science* found that the more teens were exposed to sexual content in movies, the earlier they started having sex and the likelier they were to have casual, unprotected sex.
 - Moral views about pornography have shifted, especially in Gen Z. They just don't think it's that bad. We have a porn epidemic right now.
 - 70% of 18-34 year olds regularly view pornography.
 - The average age to begin is 11 years old.
 - Porn is called "the wallpaper of our lives." Many seek it out, but even if they're not looking for porn, porn is looking for them. "The question," Christian apologist Josh McDowell says, "is not 'Will my kids see porn?' but 'How will they handle it when they do?"
 - Lie #1 about porn: "Porn is harmless."
 - * Porn is addictive. Porn actually changes the physical structure of the brain, similar to drug & alcohol addiction. For the undeveloped brain of a young person, the addictive consequences can be lifelong.
 - * Porn has serious personal ramifications. It distorts attitudes about sexuality & leads to increased sexual permissiveness & risky sexual behaviors. It also decreases marital satisfaction & breaks down trust in marriage. It leaves people with perpetual feelings of shame & guilt.

Early viewing of pornography among children leads to higher-risk sexual activity, sex addictions, & sexual violence.

Boys who are exposed to porn are 3 times more likely to engage in oral sex & intercourse 2 years after exposure than non-exposed boys.

Young girls exposed to porn are twice as like to engage in oral sex & 1/1/2 times more like to have intercourse 2 years later.

- Lie #2 about porn: "Porn is a personal matter, & it's no one's business what people do in their private lives."
 - *The consequences porn aren't limited to the individual. Porn is dehumanizing, treating others like objects to be used for the gratification of others.
 - *Porn fuels sex trafficking and leads to increased violence & sexual aggression, as well as the exploitation of women & children.
 - * Porn also produces broken marriages & families.

"There is no dignity when the human dimension is eliminated from the person. In short, the problem with pornography is not that it shows too much of the person, but that it shows far too little." (Pope John Paul II, The Theology of the Body)

10. Shrinking Attention Spans

- The average attention span has dropped from 12 seconds in 2000 to just 8.25 seconds in 2015.
 That's a 25% drop in just over a decade. To put that into perspective, the average attention span of a goldfish is 9 seconds.
 - *Percent of teens who forget major details of close friends & relatives: 25
 - *Percent of people who forget their own birthdays from time to time: 7
 - *Average number of times per hour an office worker checks their email inbox: 30
- "Gen Z takes in information instantaneously & loses interest just as fast." [Internet browsing statistics]
 - *Average length watched of a single internet video: 2.7 minutes
 - *Percent of page views that last less than 4 seconds: 17
 - Percent of page views that last more than 10 minutes: 4
 - Percent of words read on web pages with 111 words or less: 49
 - Percent of words read on an average (593 words) web page: 28
- Gen Z 'cannot' read in silence or listen to stories in length due to the 'world of endless distraction' around them.
 - *A love of reading is what increases concentration & promotes "deep thinking."
- 11. They are more open to spiritual experiences.
 - "Pitirim Sorokin, the founder of Harvard University's department of sociology, argued that the pendulum of civilization generally swings in one of two directions: the ideational & the sensate.
 - The ideational civilization is more theological & spiritual,
 - while the sensate culture is more rational or scientific.
 - Sorokin contended that the classic ideational period was the medieval. From the
 Enlightenment forward, we lived in a sensate world. Sorokin's thesis rings true. Now in our



struggle with what the modern world has given to us – or, more accurately, taken away – there seems to be a swing back toward the ideational." (Pitirim Sorokin, *Social and Cultural Dynamics*, 2010)

- "We live in a world that is more open than ever to spiritual things. Not defined religion, mind you, but spirituality. And specifically, the supernatural. A keenly felt emptiness, resulting from a secularized, materialistic world, has led to a hunger for something more, but many are unable to go further than the search for an experience. As a result, an extraterrestrial will serve as well as an angel, a spiritualist as well as a minister. Borrowing from the late historian Christopher Dawson, we have a new form of secularism that offers "religious emotion divorced from religious belief." So God is out, but ghosts are in." (Meet Generation Z, James Emery White)
- Christianity is very much a faith in the supernatural.
- People are finding that signs and wonders, in their proper biblical place, penetrate deeply secular minds.
- 12. The most defining characteristic of Gen Z is that it is the first generation in the West to be raised in a post-Christian context. It is the first post-Christian generation.
 - The younger the generation, the most post-Christian it is.
 - 78% still believe in the existence of God, but less than ½ (41%)attend weekly services, & only
 8% would city a religious leader as a role model.
 - The largest single religious category in the Harvard Crimson's 'by the numbers' survey says that 21.3% are "agnostic."
 - *An agnostic is a person who believes that nothing is known or can be known of the existence or nature of God or of anything beyond material phenomena, a person who claims neither faith nor disbelief in God.
 - This means that they are not against Christianity, but Christianity is no longer the primary shaping force of their values & belief system. (Below quotes from *Meet Generation Z*, James Emery White)
 - "I will put together my church, a church so expansive with energy that not even the gates of hell will be able to keep it out." Mt. 16:18 TMB
 - "In writing about the teaching of Jesus, John Stott noted that 'if the church realistically
 accepted his standards and values...and lived by them, it would be the alternative society he
 always intended it to be, and would offer to the world an authentic Christian counter-culture."
 - "Those two ideas church & counterculture lie at the heart of reaching a post-Christian generation. The challenge is, first to understand the ideas and, second, to engage them. Let's start with understanding, for if there is any doctrine that is ignored or grossly misunderstood by Christ followers at least among evangelical Christians in the United States it is the doctrine of the church."



- "During the calamitous 12th century, it was written "Never before had there been greater wretchedness in the country.....And they said openly that Christ and his saints slept."

 (Peterborough Chronicle, 12th century)
- One of the marks of Generation Z is that they are being raised, by and large, by Generation X a generation that was warned repeatedly not to become "helicopter" parents (i.e., always hovering over their children). As a result, Generation Z has been given more space & more independence than any other generation. This means that Generation Z is very self-directed."(Meet Generation Z: Forget Everything You Learned about Millennials," Sparks and Honey, 2014)
- "One might be tempted to say the same of our own day, particularly in relation to how we are shaping Generation Z. There are many ways to characterize them, but in essence, two headlines must not be missed. First, they are lost. They do not even have a memory of the gospel. The degree of spiritual illiteracy is simply stunning. …. Second, they are leaderless. Little if any direction is coming from their families, and even less from their attempts to access guidance from the internet. The questions I hear from men and women in their teens and twenties borders on the heartbreaking. How do I break free from pornography? How do I be a husband/wife? How do I parent? How do I pray? How do I...? The list of life's most foundational questions is virtually endless, and Generation Z is asking each and every one. They have endless amounts of information but little wisdom, and virtually no mentors."

B. Personal Breaking Points

1. Abuse from within:

a. Childhood disappointments

- Hanging onto hurts -- everything from hand-me-down tricycles to neglect to abuses
- Eph. 4:32 (NIV) "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave vou."
- Mt. 18:34 (NIV) "In anger his master turned him over to the jailers until he should pay back all he owed." (KJV) "...tormentors..."

b. Imagined abuses

• Fears from feeding on humanistic, worldly perspectives

Col. 2:8 (NIV) "See to it that no one takes you captive through hollow and deceptive philosophy, which depends on human tradition and the basic principles of this world rather than on Christ."

Comparison plague

"I'm not beautiful!" - define what is "beautiful."

"I'm dumb!" - define what is "intelligent."

- **2 Cor. 10:12** (NIV) "We do not dare to classify or compare ourselves with some who commend themselves. When they measure themselves by themselves and compare themselves with themselves, they are not wise."
- Vain imaginations

"I am not what I think I am: I am not what vou think I am: I am what I think vou think I am."

2 Cor.10:5 (NIV) "We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ."

c. Unbroken Bondages

<u>Secret sins</u> – i.e. smoking, drinking, drugs, lust, sexual obsessions, eating disorders...

Keeping them secret gives them power over you.

• It may be impossible to be completely "pure," but it's NOT impossible to be Godly. We are redeemed & purified by

Christ. We are all in the process of maturing in our Godliness.

• **Heb. 12:1** (NIV) "Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us."

"entangles" = habitually clings to , to hem in on all sides

2. Abuse from without:



Remember: Your self-image comes from God. [You're the gold IN the necklace, not just the necklace. You're the boat twice-owned.]

- a. <u>Mental & verbal abuse:</u> constant berating in the home; bullying
- b. <u>Sexual abuse:</u> feel unclean, unclear on definition of virginity
- **c.** <u>Social status extremes:</u> from riches to poverty or from poverty to riches; growing up with one standard and changing that in adulthood
- i.e. Science experiment: college students given white mice to run through maze and then student teachers with students (1/2 'slow learners'). Each came up to the given level of expectation.

Lesson: Others opinions are NOT always accurate.

If you look for your identity outside yourself, you'll be in bondage to others'



Moses was still Moses whether he was in Egypt or the wilderness.

"Moses" = drawn out one; rescued one

What he DID help to define him to those who looked to him, but WHO he was what who God said he was – who GOD made him to be, regardless of what he did.

c. <u>Jacob</u>


Gen. 28:15 God sent him out from his father & land, but promised to KEEP him.


This freed Him to BE a friend rather than to EXPECT friendship.

If you look for your identity outside of yourself, you'll be in bondage to others' opinions.

"Never doubt in darkness what God has shown you in the light." (Beyond the Next Mountain, re: 1st missionary to East Indian Mountains – 1st convert – father of Rochunga Podiate – Rochunga's wife made this statement to him in a time of discouragement.)





1. We have a mandate of reconciliation

2 Cor. 5:18-20 (NIV) "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us **the ministry of reconciliation**: (19) that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting men's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation.. (20) We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us...."

- God judges those who refuse to forgive.
 - Mt. 18:34 (turned over to tormentors mentioned previously)
- Total blindness comes when you refuse to forgive. You cannot see who you are when you are boxed in with hatred or bitterness.

2. <u>Jephthah</u>

Jdgs. 11:1-11 Jephthah was a son of Gilead & a harlot, rejected by his half-brothers. He went to live in the land of Tob, which was a stop-over for caravans in the desert.

Tob = headache from drunkenness

When Israel went to war, the brothers went to get Jephthah to be their captain.

Captain - one who goes to the front lines.

Jepthah had to forgive to do that!

3. <u>Joseph</u>


<u>Gen. 42</u> Joseph's moment of forgiveness "You meant it for evil, but God allowed it for good."

- Are you willing to use counsel for confirmation of your thoughts?




- 1. <u>Discerning between conviction and condemnation:</u>





- Joshua served the people in the wilderness for 40 years, as well as serving Moses. He received Moses' anointing, his own mountain in the Promised Land, victory as a leader he conquered 6 nations & 33 leaders.
- Bro. Wency Wenceslaus Farlow (the janitor & ran the overhead projector on Sun. mornings) The grade school principal asked a 1st grader "Who do you think is the most important person in Bible Temple?" (He thought the child would say the "Sr. Pastor." The church was approximately 600-700 in attendance at that time.) The child said "Bro. Wency!" When asked "Why Bro. Wency?" He said, "Well, he gets to run the overhead projector on Sun. mornings, AND he has all the keys!"

 - a. Unresolved Conflicts: Rejection by others
 - b. Fear: Rejection of self
 - a. Believe the lie
 - b. Battle of the extremes:
 - False humility = "I have no worth."
 - <u>Pride</u> = "I'm the greatest."
 - Resentment & Bitterness: Rejection from others
 - a. <u>Unable to hear the Father's voice</u> (Jesus/Phil.2—"attentively listening," Leah --Simeon/Gen.29 - "hearing")
 - b. <u>Unable to distinguish conviction from condemnation</u>
 - d. Anger: Rejection to others &/or to self
 - Unable to "esteem others" (Phil. 2) because of intense need to focus on self
 - e. Death: Violence to self &/or to others
 - Murder &/or suicide
 - No lasting fruit

B. The fruit of a healed & progressive self-image

- i. Unresolved conflicts: Rejection by othersWe all face disappointment at some time in life.
- ii. Issue forgiveness: Release others to the Father's judgment
- iii. Controlled self-thoughts: Thoughts in control (Ro. 12:3)
- iv. Service & love extended: Esteeming others (Phil. 2)
- v. Life: Lasting fruit
- vi. Reproduction: Leaving a legacy
